Music of the American Revolution 5th Grade

Materials needed:

One copy for each group of their song and related questions.

Schedule a computer lab to do the research on the songs and create the prezi. If the students have never used prezi, you can have them create a poster or powerpoint. Prezi is very easy to learn. You would need 15-20 minutes to demonstrate how to use the site and another 15-20 for students to practice. Introduction: Show youtube video: http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=tNqUORIFV41, God Bless the USA, or a similar video that you think your students would relate to.

Ask the students what they think about when they hear this video? What does it mean to them?

Tell the students that we are going to examine songs from the Revolutionary War period. (There are 7 songs in this packet. The World Turned Upside Down is the most difficult. You can choose to do as many songs as fit your class.)

Divide the group into how many teams you have chosen and assign one song to each team. Give each team the instruction page with their assigned song.

Students should first research the song and answer the questions. There is a link on each page to the music for the song. However, the students will need to do additional research to learn more about the song. (30-45 minutes)

Students then create either a poster, powerpoint or Prezi about their song. (30-45 minutes) This could be done at home if students have access to a computer and can work in a group after school.

Students then present the information about their assigned song.
