Total pages: 194.

While reading complete the table & reading guide that follows. It is not necessary to quote large portions of the text, on the contrary you will better understand and remember the text if you paraphrase or summarize the text within each category on the table. Include the page numbers paraphrased at the end of your summaries or quotes. The seven focus areas for your notes include:

- 1. Who were the native peoples of the American Southwest?
- 2. How were the cultures of native peoples affected by Spanish colonialism, and later by American expansion?
- 3. What did Spanish colonization efforts look like? What was unique about Spain's colonization of the New World?
- 4. How were the colonization efforts of Spain, France, and England both similar and different?
- 6. What were the causes of the Mexican Revolution and how did the Mexican State impact the evolution and development of the American Southwest?
- 7. Evaluate the key themes, events and partisans of American emigration into the Southwest.
